
# <u>~~ Christmas Float ~~</u>

One might ask, *"What is he doing?!"* And a very good question that's addressed in the following newspaper caption: "Carey Junior High School science teacher, Paul Crips, stands on a lab table to discuss the Big Dipper, represented by the tin foil balls, hanging from the ceiling. Crips has been chosen as one of 25 U.S. Stardust Fellowship winners. Crips will receive training on the Stardust Mission, a NASA mission to gather comet debris, and then will be qualified to teach other educators on the subject."

Quite an honor back in the day and to think he is now a priest at St. Christopher's, ordained in 2021. What amazing accomplishments, Father Paul.

For soon the leaves will die And the long hard wind will blow May this world find a resting place Where the peaceful waters flow





# Father Paul's Corner about an amazing Minister



The Rev. Dr. John Roberts was born in Wales in 1853, and while training for Anglican ordination, felt called to serve among his Native American sisters and brothers in North America. Following several years of service in the Bahamas and Colorado, he began his ministry on the Wind River Reservation in Wyoming, USA in 1883. Not long after his arrival, he conducted the funeral for Sacajawea, who as a young Eastern Shoshone woman, was the remarkable guide on the renowned Lewis and Clark

expedition. The Rev. Roberts was well ahead of his time, as he embraced Native American customs, languages, and expressions of spirituality. The Rev. John Roberts cultivated close friendships with tribal leaders, including the renowned Eastern Shoshone Chief Washakie and Northern Arapaho Chief Black Coal, and was referred to with deep affection as "White Robe" and "Elder Brother. "If there were negotiations with U.S. government officials, the tribes would not proceed without the Rev. Roberts being present. His work led him, with the assistance of tribal leadership, to establish two alternative schools on sacred land gifted by the tribes that focused on honoring and preserving Indigenous culture. One of the schools is on the National Register of Historic Places today. In addition to the Rev. Robert's ministry on the Wind River Reservation, he founded all the Episcopal churches among white settlers within a 150-mile radius, in Fremont County, Wyoming, including the present-day Episcopal churches in the cities and towns of Lander, Riverton, Thermopolis, Atlantic City, Morton, Crowheart and Dubois, as well as churches that no longer exist in Milford, Hudson and Shoshoni. The Rev. John Roberts lived a remarkable life and left a legacy that continues to have great influence today. He was awarded honorary doctorate degrees from the University of Wyoming and Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. He died in 1949 at the age of 96, and the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho peoples honor his legacy to this day. Wyoming's state flag is flown at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. in his honor.

# This Year's Annual Convention in Casper, WY

"The Community of Creator, Embracing Indigenous Wisdom to Live well into the future".



The 57<sup>th</sup> annual Episcopal Church Convention was held October 6-8 in Casper, and this year's theme was centered around the Episcopal Church in Wyoming and the Indigenous population. The keynote speaker was the Rev. Dr. Randy Woodley who is a farmer, author, activist, and scholar.

Convention delegates and others were also involved in passing a resolution that offered support from the church for help in Wyoming with the alarming high suicide rate. Delegates also voted for new members on various committees such as the Standing Committee, Commission on Ministry, and filling vacancies on the Episcopal Church Foundation. The convention ended with a service at Saint Marks Episcopal Church in Casper. Delegates from Saint Christopher's for this year's convention were The Reverend Paul Crips, Janet Osborn, and Luisa Vigil. John Sullivan also attended the convention but was representing the Diocesan Council, region IV.



## **Bishop's Epiphany 2023 Booklist** By Bishop Paul-Gordan Chandler

An American Martyr in Persia: The Epic Life and Tragic Death of Howard Baskerville – Reza Aslan This new book by the Iranian born New York


Times best-selling author Reza Aslan, reads

like evocative fiction. It tells the fascinating true story of Howard Baskerville, a young American Presbyterian missionary from South Dakota to Persia in the early 1900s. Baskerville was the best possible example of an American missionary, as he allows himself to be educated by the local people, leading him to identify with the struggle for democracy of the Persian students to whom he was teaching

English. Baskerville declares, "The only difference between me and these people is the place of my birth, and that is not a big difference." He ends up being killed, fighting alongside his students in their quest to transform their country. Today Baskerville remains venerated in Iran, where thousands of Iranians visit his grave each year. This book is beautifully written and completely engrossing, with great contemporary relevance.
